
LIFT supports community members impacted by the housing crisis, substance use, and economic insecurity —people who already navigate uncertainty every day.

During the 2021 heat dome, LIFT opened its doors as an informal cooling space. When wildfire smoke blanketed the region, they adjusted services to help people stay safe.





What can non-profits do?



Assess your climate risk

Identify the climate-related events that could impact your ability to operate, such as extreme heat, wildfire smoke, or flooding.



Create adaptable plans

Develop a simple response plan that outlines who does what when a disruption happens, and ensure they are flexible enough to handle a variety of scenarios.



Identify funding opportunities

Research grants, partnerships, and other funding sources that can support your climate adaptation efforts, both for immediate response and long-term resilience.
